Community Presentations & Communications:

Kathy McCue and Chris Angeconeb have accepted invitations from 16 First Nations and 2 Tribal Councils for community based information presentations.

Lindsay Mullin has been busy coordinating our web-site, social media and communications activities including a mail out of pamphlets and other publications to every Women's Shelter in Canada.

We continue to respond to on-reserve residents seeking assistance in understanding their individual rights and protections under FHRMIRA.

2017-2018 MRP Special Pilot Project

Similar to last year, the COEMRP was able to secure MRP Pilot Project funding to assist First Nations in their law-making endeavours. First Nations are eligible to obtain \$25,000 per category. This year we have provided the following financial assistance and support:

Category # 1: Development of Laws; Legal Fees and Consultation with the Community

Professional Development Unit

This fiscal year, NALMA focused on building their Professional Development Unit (PDU). This effort has included hiring a new Director of Education and Training, Carly Armstrong, to lead the unit and support the delivery of our Professional Lands Management Certification Program (PLMCP) and NALMA's specialized training. As the director, Carly works alongside NALMA's Master Instructor Debra Campbell and Executive Support, Buffy Hill to achieve the goals and objectives of the PDU. Together, the PDU supports the on-going training and networking needs of NALMA members and other professionals working in the field of land management.

Working effectively in lands management requires a broad knowledge base and skill set. NALMA's PLMCP and specialized training is designed to support First Nations in building their capacity in the profession of lands management as it grows and evolves. Our specialized training toolkits provide knowledge, tools and information as laws and legislation change and new issues and technology emerge in the field of land management.

Professional Lands Management Certification Program

In order to implement the Reserve Land and Environment Management Program (RLEMP), NALMA in collaboration with INAC and subject matter experts developed the Professional Lands Management Certification Program (PLMCP). NALMA's PLMCP is used across Canada to signify that a Land Manager meets specific criteria, keeps current in the field, and adheres to a professional Code of Ethics. It represents both an achievement and a responsibility for the individual Land Manager.

Specialized Training

<u>Estates Management Toolkit</u>: The Estates Management Toolkit presents a number of common principles, best practices, suggested methods, as well as questions for your consideration when dealing with estates. This toolkit training provides participants with the basic concepts of estates management and will walk you through the process of wills, from notification of death to distribution and closing the estate.

<u>Land Regime Toolkit</u>: The introduction to Land Regimes Toolkit was developed as a practical aid for First Nations' use in the task of adopting a land regime that better suites their needs. Culture, tradition, type of regime, experience, available resources and the wishes of the community are all factors that must be considered to help determine the direction the First Nation chooses for managing its land and affairs.

<u>Additions to Reserve/Reserve Creation:</u> The primary focus of this training is to provide participants with a clear understanding of the ATR/RC process and the First Nation's role in developing their ATR/RC proposal. Participants learned about the new policy directives outlined in Chapter 10 of the Land Management Manual.

<u>Environmental Management Toolkit:</u> This training provides participants with a general overview of Environmental Management on Reserve Lands. Participants gain an understanding of how to develop an Environmental Management plan for the community.

<u>Land Use Planning Toolkit:</u> This training provides participants with a general overview of LUP, with a primary focus on best practices in developing a Land Use Plan for their community.

Land Use Planning and Survey Unit

Land Use Planning (LUP) is a branch of urban planning which is designed to assist communities in reaching the unique long-term social, economic, and environmental goals for their lands. It defines where houses, schools, hospitals, businesses, roads, parks, and natural areas can be situated within a community. Implementation of an LUP will allow for efficient delivery of services and healthy community growth, while preserving cultural and ecological values. LUPs inform and compliment the creation of regulations such as laws and bylaws to ensure responsible and sustainable land use.

The NALMA Land Use Planning Unit was launched in 2017 to address the need for LUP support. This unit will initiate outreach activities, provide direct technical training, support services and capacity building opportunities to assist First Nations in the development of Land Use Planning. The LUP Unit will work with First Nations across Canada to identify specific goals and desired outcomes, and assist with LUP implementation.

Near the end of the 2016/17 fiscal year, it was decided that the survey program would better serve the First Nations by working in conjunction with the creation of a new Land Use Planning department. Look to the coming years to bring new and exciting challenges, as we will continue to provide technical expertise to assist Land Managers in their role







The objective of the Survey Program included the following:


- Delivery of INAC survey program, specifically for non-First N Management (FNLM) First Nations;
- 2. Survey program to be delivered through an outsourcing of technical expertise arrangement to facilitate immediate transition and support readiness;
- 3. Contractual management of survey program funding to support external surveys only and whereby INAC selects the survey project priorities within each Region;
- 4. Prepare and send out communications outlining and promoting survey program delivery to INAC, NRCan, and eligible First Nations.the

NALMA will apply for funds to provide training and capacity building for First Nation Land Managers to attend various training programs. In the past, NALMA has been successful in obtaining funds to assist participants in a number of training initiatives.

Technical Expertise

NALMA is able to provide technical expertise in the area of land management to First Nation Land Managers, First Nation organizations and government agencies.

Referrals

NALMA will refer First Nations Land Managers requiring assistance on day-to-day land issues or general inquiries, to Regional Lands Associations, individual First Nation Land Managers or government and professional agencies.



RLEMP Engagement Sessions

Indigenous and Northern Affairs Canada (INAC) in partnership with the National Aboriginal Lands Managers Association (NALMA) hosted 8 engagement sessions across the country as part of INACs efforts to modernize the Reserve Lands and Environment Management Program (RLEMP). The purpose of these sessions was to learn from First Nations how RLEMP could be improved to better meet the land and environmental management goals of the communities.

Participants: Overall, 330 participants from 224 First Nations attended the engagement sessions.

A Special thank you to Regional Lands Associations members who participated in the Community Perspectives Panels at each of the RLEMP Engagement Sessions.

Findings: The experience and advice shared during the engagement process illustrated the deep love and respect First Nation lands managers have for their communities and the land. We heard from hundreds of people and gained a better view of the priorities, challenges and aspirations of First Nation participants regarding lands management. A common thread heard from coast to coast is that lands management is about protecting the land for future generations, working towards their own community vision for a healthy and sustainable future, creating economic and social opportunities, and taking significant steps towards self-determination.

Three main themes were discussed at each engagement session, including:

- Finding Solutions
 The Reserve Land and Environment Management Program Renewal Discussion Guide

 Land Control C
- 1. Capacity development and availability of training
- 2. Developing a funding formula that better reflected the true work of lands and environment managers on reserve
- 3. How Indigenous and Northern Affairs Canada (INAC) could better position the program within the suite of lands programs and regimes available to First Nations so that more communities can participate and employ a lands manager
