

Centre of Excellence for Matrimonial Real Property

MRP Special Pilot Project Funding:

There are six categories of funding currently available. First Nations can apply for funding one category at a time:

- Increasing Community Members' Awareness of the Family Homes on Reserves and Matrimonial Interests or Rights Act (FHRMIRA) as it relates to their community & discussions on the option to enact a community-specific law
- 2. Development of Laws: Legal Fees and Consultation with the Community
- 3. Ratification Vote
- 4. Operational Considerations: Internal Capacity and Procedural Development
- 5. Increase Availability and Awareness of Community-Specific Laws 6. Operational Considerations under the Provisional Federal Rules
- 6. Operational considerations under the Provisional Federal Rules on of this Act

To date, 61 First Nations have accessed the fund and 54 projects have been completed. We have had 12 projects withdraw or not complete work due to competing priorities.

9 projects carried their work from 2018-2019 into 2019-2020. 4 of those have completed that work and there are 11 new projects, leaving 16 active projects are ongoing this year.

Dispute Resolution Model – Pilot Site

In 2018-2019 the centre developed two Dispute Resolution Models for MRP Regimes on Reserve. A review of the materials occurred early in the fiscal year and a pilot site was chosen for the implementation of a community-specific dispute resolution process.

Whitefish River First Nation was established as the pilot site for the Dispute Resolution Project. This community has been working through a committee of Council to review the dispute resolution template documents, and provide direction on processes, priorities, and traditional practices to be incorporated and any new content and documents to develop. Other activities include: Prepare consultation plan to provide information to the community on the dispute resolution documents and to receive their input through a variety of means such as survey monkey, monthly newsletter, and community sessions. Source training opportunities for those who will participate in the dispute resolution process.

Community-Based Presentations and Training

Our MRP Specialists continue to offer presentations and training. Visits to First Nations continue to be scheduled with the team.

Two On-reserve Toolkit Training sessions have occurred so far this year. There were 17 attendees at our Edmonton session and 9 at the Toronto session.

One Focused Toolkit Training session is scheduled for February in Dartmouth, NS.

MRP Conference 2020

In November, over a hundred people gathered for the National MRP Conference 2020. The COEMRP Team organized the event to provide the most recent information to assist in understanding the impact of the *Family Homes on Reserves and Matrimonial Interests or Rights Act*, and the First Nations role in its implementation. The objectives for this event were to:

- Provide information on the current status and emerging developments relating to Matrimonial Real Property onreserve including a case law review.
- Hear accounts from First Nations representatives who are currently drafting a Matrimonial Real Property Law and those who already have a law in place.
- Learn about dispute resolution processes including the newly drafted Dispute Resolution Models developed by the Centre.
- Network with other professionals and community leaders to gain knowledge and share experiences and information

Training, support and funding will continue to be made available in 20-21. The team looks forward to continuing to work with First Nations and organizations across the country.

We will also be working on materials that will support individuals in preparing wills and domestic contracts.



NEW PARTNERSHIP!

NALMA is excited to announce a new partnership with the Vancouver Island University. A Memorandum of Understanding was formally signed at a signing ceremony at VIU in October 2019. The Signing Ceremony was attended by faculty, staff and high-level leadership, including the VIU President, ISC-HQ Director General, ISC-BC Region Director of Lands and NALMA Board of Directors. We are thrilled that this partnership has been formalized and finalized and are working closely with VIU on the development and implementation of level I in British Columbia. Ongoing collaboration is taking place with the curriculum development. Registration is open this Fall for first intake.

PLAR – Prior Learning Assessment and Recognition for PLMCP

2019-2020 was the Pilot year for this option being available for people wishing to challenge Level I and/or Level II PLMCP Competencies. The first PLAR Portfolio has been submitted for review and will be considered for evaluation by our trained PLAR Assessors. We have additional PLAR Assessor Training taking February 2020. Our PLAR Assessors are themselves PLMCP Certified Lands Managers who are subject matter experts. We presently have 5 Candidates challenging the PLMCP Competencies for either or both Level I and/or Level II through the NALMA PLAR process.

Professional Lands Management Certification Program

NALMA's PLMCP is used across Canada to signify that a Land Manager meets specific criteria, keeps current in the field, and adheres to a professional Code of Ethics. It represents both an achievement and a responsibility for the individual Land Manager. NALMA is the National certifying body for Professional Lands Managers in Canada. Graduates of the program are considered "general practitioners" able to work across Canada under any land regime.

Level One: Post Secondary Component - There are now three (3) Post-Secondary Options to complete Level One of PLMCP!



Established in 2006, the Kanawayhetaytan Askiy (KA) Program continues to run with many keen students. Students in this program begin in May and continue for approximately 12 months. There are 3 on-site components of 2 weeks each as well as an online component.

Students accepted into this program will attend onsite training beginning in May for 2 weeks, then attend an additional 1 week on-site course in the months of June, July and August. A final online component will be available for students once all other course work is completed.

Level Two: Technical Component - Delivered by NALMA

Module 101: History and Legislation - This course is a general introduction of reserve land management within the Indian reserve system. The course is designed to provide historical and up-to-date information on topics relevant to First Nation land management.

August 17-21, 2020 - Ottawa, ON

Module 201: Fundamentals - This course is designed to introduce students to the basic fundamental land management tools, policies and procedures, and associated activities required to successfully manage reserve lands. Students will become more familiar with the basic concepts of effective land management.

September 21-25, 2020 - Calgary, AB

Module 301: Collective and Individual Interests - This course is a study of collective and individual interests on reserve lands. It is designed to provide students with the knowledge and skills required to successfully complete transactions relating to collective and individual interest. Students will become more familiar with interpreting policies and procedures, and recognizing appropriate authorities. Studying the components of policy-making and authorities will allow students to appreciate the relationship between collective and individual interests.

October 26-30, 2020 - Toronto, ON

Module 401A: Leasing I - This course is Part I of II and is designed to introduce students to the knowledge and skills required to initiate a lease on reserve lands. Students will be exposed to the legal rules enabling or constraining lease management decisions. A study of the stages of leasing using some specific examples that lands managers have to deal with regularly. Students will examine the process from the proposal stage to satisfying the environmental requirements and, designations, surrenders and the referendum process. Students will be required to interpret policies and procedures, within the appropriate authority(ies).

November 30-December 4, 2020 – Westbank, BC

Module 401B: Leasing II - This course is Part II of II and is designed to provide students with the advanced skills and knowledge required to complete a lease on reserve lands, from incorporating environmental management including compliance and monitoring, managing the negotiation, execution, registration and administration to termination or cancellation, and all related instruments to a lease.

December 21-January 24, 2021 - Online

Module 501: Permits - The purpose of this course is to provide students with the advanced skills and knowledge required to complete a permit on reserve lands. Students will become familiar with the basic components of a permit and recognize the factors which positively or negatively affect reserve lands. Students will examine the stages of permits and the requirements at each stage including environmental management, compliance and monitoring, managing the negotiation, execution, registration and administration to termination or cancellation.

February 8-12, 2021 - Vancouver, BC

Land Use Planning Unit

NALMA's Land Use Planning (LUP) Unit works to build capacity for LUP in First Nations communities across Canada.

The objectives of the LUP Unit are accomplished through:

- Raising awareness of the importance of community LUP through education and outreach
- Training workshops for land managers on LUP
- Developing Toolkit and resource material
- Identifying funding support for LUP Initiatives
- Engaging communities in the process of LUP
- Providing technical service to communities to support LUP development and implementation
- Collaborating with regional Land Associations and partners
- Preserving key cultural elements unique to communities



In Fiscal Year 2019-2020, the LUP Unit has updated and refined the Toolkit Training materials and participant resources for workshops. This year, over 50 First Nation land managers have been trained on LUP through workshops in Winnipeg, MB, Quebec City, QC, Saskatoon, SK, and Calgary, AB (anticipated January 2020), with a workshop focused on Project Management planned February 25-27 in Vancouver, BC.

In addition, the Unit has developed presentations, resources, and training for the Algoma University Taking Care of Our Lands Symposium (Sault Ste. Marie, ON), First Nation Land Use Planning Tour and Site Visit for NALMA's PLMCP students at Algoma University (Sault Ste. Marie, ON), Community Land Use Planning Workshop at Links to Learning BC (Vancouver, BC) and OALA LUP Presentation (Mississauga, ON).

The LUP Unit is also working with our partners at Indigenous Services Canada (ISC) to revise and update the National LUP Application Initiative to provide financial support to First Nation communities undertaking Land Use Planning.

- Other surveys to support land administration as recommended by INAC




- Ensure project readiness
- Provide ongoing communication to ensure issues are addressed during all phases of the project

Other Activities

The Survey Unit further supports First Nations by:

- Attending site visits to various locations when required and when feasible.
- Developing contacts with industry related professionals in GIS, GPS and CAD programs
- Investigating opportunities for the development of a GIS training program for NALMA members

Survey Toolkit Training



This Toolkit has been developed to provide an understanding of surveys on Indian Reserves and the accompanying products, records, and systems. The user will achieve the basic concepts of locating boundaries, survey posts, making sketches, and surveying terminology. The Toolkit was piloted in October 2019.

Environment Unit

Establishing NALMA's Environment Unit

This fiscal is the first full year for NALMA's Environment Unit. So far it has been a busy year focused on establishing the Unit and its goals and priorities, developing new tools and resources, and participating in many collaborative projects across the country. Read on for more detail on the new resources being developed, the projects the unit has been involved in and important changes to Federal Environmental legislation and the ISC Environmental Review Process.

Environment Unit Activities

Development of new toolkits

In order to identify priorities for the development of new tools and resources, the Environment Unit has reviewed feedback received through the National Engagement on the Reserve Land Environmental Management Program (RLEMP), NALMA's National Survey and collaborated with NALMA's Regional Lands Associations to establish national priorities for toolkit and resource development.

This year, the Unit is developing 4 new toolkits, which will be ready for pilot deliveries next fiscal year!

- Climate Change Toolkit
- Species-at-Risk Management Toolkit
- Contaminated Sites Management Toolkit
- Waste Management On Reserve

Participating on ISC National Environment Officer Working Group

NALMA's Environment Coordinator has been invited to participate in a National Environmental Officers Working Group hosted by Indigenous Services Canada. This working group is reviewing Chapter 12 of the Land Management Manual on Environmental Obligations and updating the chapter to reflect current environmental legislation and best practices. Once a new draft is fully developed and finalized it will be shared with NALMA members.

Building Environmental Content for NALMA's Online Resource Library - PeerSite

Over the past year, the Environment Unit has been gathering resources and organizing them on NALMA's online library, PeerSite. The site is constantly being updated and added to, so be sure to log-in and see what's online. This is a great place to start if you are researching a new environmental issue in your community.

If you have an environmental tool or resource you would like to share with other NALMA members, it can be added to our PeerSite library.

Responding to Member Inquiries

The Environment Unit is here to answer questions and support your Nation as you build your environmental programs. We respond to inquiries, provide information, and access to experts across the country to help address your environmental concerns. Feel free to reach out if you have questions, training needs, or need support in addressing environmental challenges in your community.

Changes to Federal Environmental Legislation

This year, several changes to Canada's Environmental Legislation were brought into force, including:

- Establishment of the Impact Assessment Act, 2019 and repealing the Canadian Environmental Assessment Act;
- Important Amendments to the Fisheries Act; and
- Changes to the Navigation Protection Act, which was renamed the Canadian Navigable Waters Act and amended.



NALMA's Environmental Management Toolkit has been updated to reflect the new legislative changes. **The toolkit is available on PeerSite**, so head over to our online library to learn more about this new legislation. We encourage NALMA members to attend the Environmental Management Toolkit to learn about these changes in depth.

Indigenous Forum for Cumulative Effects

NALMA's Environment Coordinator is sitting on the planning committee for the upcoming Indigenous Forum for Cumulative Effects. The Forum is taking place in Calgary, February 4-6 2020. This exciting event will bring together Indigenous Environmental Practitioners from across the country to discuss the importance of cumulative effects management, strategies for managing cumulative effects in community, and will showcase the important work of communities who are leading the way in cumulative effects management. Expected Updates to ISC Environmental Review Process (ERP)

The significant changes made to Federal Environmental Legislation are having a ripple effect through ISC policies, such as the ERP. At this point, we are aware that changes to the process are being made to reflect the new legislative context, but finalized changes to the ERP have not been made public yet. NALMA's Environment Unit is tracking these policy changes and will keep members in the loop as they become available.

Professional Lands Management Certification Program - Training in Land Management

To Whom It May Concern,

The Reserve Land and Environment Management Program (RLEMP) provides financial support to First Nation communities to build capacity to undertake land management functions under the *Indian Act*. Specifically, it provides First Nation land managers with the tools, skills and knowledge required to manage all aspects of land, natural resources and the environment on reserve (see Annex A for additional information on the program).

In 2017, the Department partnered with the National Aboriginal Lands Managers Association (NALMA) to engage First Nation leaders and land managers on how to make RLEMP more responsive to First Nation needs. 351 participants from 224 First Nations, including Chiefs, Councillors, Land Managers, Environmental Officers, and other First Nation Officials were consulted as part of this national engagement.

During the national engagement, participants identified many desired improvements, including those related to the accessibility and availability of the Professional Lands Management Certification Program (PLMCP). Supported through RLEMP, the PLMCP is a two-year program that builds capacity in land and environmental management on reserve and includes both post-secondary courses and technical training modules. In particular, engagement participants voiced strong support for the need to train more than one land manager per First Nation as a measure of sound succession planning.

In response to this feedback, and with the goal of continual improvements to the current RLEMP and the delivery of land and environment management services on reserve, we are pleased to announce that Indigenous Services Canada (ISC) is working with NALMA to make enhancements to the PLMCP.

These enhancements include:

- new funding for communities already in RLEMP to train an additional land manager; and
- a new partnership with Vancouver Island University for the delivery of PLMCP Level 1 starting in May 2020, in addition to existing sites of delivery at the University of Saskatchewan and the Algoma University in Ontario (initiated in 2019).







In addition, NALMA continues to address other feedback received from the national engagement, including the need for more environmental training, as well as recognition of land management experience through prior learning assessments.

For First Nations in RLEMP wishing to train an additional land manager, ISC expects to have funding for up to 40 additional places in 2020, with more opportunities in future years. Priority will be given to First Nations whose certified land manager has vacated their position, thus allowing those communities to continue their ability to support administration of their lands, environment and resources. Other requests to certify an additional land manager will be assessed based on availability of funding and training spaces. Options for French training are being explored. Professional development courses offered by NALMA are also available to First Nations in RLEMP.

If you wish to certify an additional land manager in your community or if you have any questions or concerns, please contact your ISC Regional Office or send an email to RLEMP@aadnc-aandc.gc.ca. For those interested in registering in the PLMCP Level 1 starting in 2020, please indicate your interest before February 1st, 2020. Please note the registration deadlines for PLMCP Level 1 in Annex B.

For First Nations not currently participating in RLEMP, we are exploring opportunities to enrich knowledge on land and environment management through training. Based on the availability of funding and training spaces, this may be offered in the form of professional development courses provided by NALMA, or the opportunity to certify a land manager through the PLMCP. This training does not guarantee intake into RLEMP: the existing eligibility criteria for the Program remain in place. Applications will be assessed on a case by case basis. Please indicate your interest before February 1st.

Reserve Land and Environment Management Program

The Reserve Land and Environment Management Program (RLEMP) is a capacity building and training program through which First Nations exercise increased responsibility over their reserve land, resources and environment by undertaking *Indian Act* land management activities on behalf of the Minister of Indigenous Services.

The RLEMP is expected to enhance decision-making at the community level in regards to land use and environmental management. As a result, the community will be able to take advantage of land-based economic development opportunities on reserve. For interested First Nations, this could facilitate a community's transition beyond the *Indian Act* into land management regimes with greater authority, such as First Nations Land Management or comprehensive self-government.

Some of the current eligibility criteria for RLEMP include having land management activity registered within the Indian Lands Registry, pursuing economic development projects or activities, and being in a generally stable financial situation.

Professional Lands Management Certification Program

The Professional Lands Management Certification Program (PLMCP) offers professional training to First Nations land managers so that they may strengthen their knowledge and skills through a two-level process. The goal of this program is to help First Nations build capacity to effectively manage their lands and environment under the *Indian Act*. It represents both an achievement and a responsibility for the individual Land Manager.

A Land Manager successfully completing *Level One: Post-Secondary Training* and *Level Two: Technical Training* will be eligible to receive a Professional Lands Management Certification certificate from NALMA.

Post-secondary training (Level 1)

The post-secondary (Level 1) training is currently delivered by the University of Saskatchewan and Algoma University in Ontario. Starting in May 2020, it will also be offered by the Vancouver Island University. This training provides new land managers with the basic knowledge they need to manage the legal and environmental aspects of their reserve lands. Each program offers different courses, but provides a foundation for learning in the field of lands management.

Starting in April every year, the program takes 12 months to complete and requires both on-campus, online and at-home study periods.

A Level 1 certificate of achievement is received from the relevant university upon successful completion. Post-secondary training must be completed before technical training can begin.

Technical training (Level 2)

Technical training is delivered by NALMA, commencing in August of each year and also takes 12 months to complete. This training gives new land managers practical, hands-on experience to manage the day-to-day legal and environmental obligations of lands management on reserve.

To complete this training, a participant must finish:

- · five technical courses, each conducted over a one-week period
- · one online technical course conducted over a five week study period
- 37 hours of relevant work experience

A Level 2 certificate of achievement is received from NALMA recognizing the successful completion of the technical training.

After completing the post-secondary training and the technical training, graduates will have earned National Certification as a Land Manager, recognizing expertise as a practitioner in land management.


